'Algoma Boulevard riots' rocked Oshkosh 50 years ago

Fifty years ago, a growing anti-war movement erupted on what is now the UW Oshkosh campus when thousands of students rioted, blockading Algoma Boulevard, lighting tires and trash cans on fire, and digging up a 30-foot section of road with pickaxes and shovels.

The incident became known as "the Algoma Boulevard Riots," a cultural collision between President Richard Nixon's "moral majority" and the counterculture in Oshkosh, according to research from UWO history professor Stephen Kercher and students Jean Westerhaus and Alex Schoenbeck.

Evers expands operations for non-essential businesses, Oshkosh charges first business for violating Safer at Home order

On Monday, Gov. Tony Evers issued an executive order to expand operations for nonessential businesses, which took effect at 8 a.m. Wednesday.

The order allows nonessential businesses to offer curbside drop-off of goods and animals, for outdoor recreational rentals of boats, kayaks, ATVs and other vehicles, and it also allows automatic car washes.

UWO announces 15% salary cut for some administrators 180 to be placed on continuous furlough

UW Oshkosh Chancellor Andrew Leavitt announced on April 24 that the university is taking new steps to balance its budget, which include a 15% salary reduction for himself and vice chancellors.

In a campus-wide email, Leavitt added that approximately 180 UWO employees were notified by Human Resources that they will be placed on a continuous furlough effective May 4, and extending for 90 working days through Aug. 31.

EPA relaxes enforcement of environmental regulations

On March 26, the Environmental Protection Agency announced that the department would be retroactively relaxing enforcement of environmental regulations and fines during the COVID-19 pandemic, starting March 13, 2020.

According to a news release by the EPA, organizations that wish to skip the regulations must first "document decisions made to prevent or mitigate noncompliance and demonstrate how the noncompliance was caused by the COVID-19 pandemic."

This means that the EPA will not take action against facilities that prove COVID-19 gave them no choice but to violate water and air pollution regulations during the pandemic. However, the guidelines about what constitutes "non-compliance" are vague at best.
